Cultivating and Giving Thanks

When I was young, I spent hours watching "Nature shows" on PBS. My mom always said, "why are you wasting your time on that. You'll never use any of that information."

Well, I do use that information, almost every day!! Sometimes our passions and missions are clear very early on. I followed my passion and graduated from Texas A&M University with a Bachelor of Science in Wildlife and Fisheries and a minor in Elementary Education. I started out working as a teacher at the Houston Zoo and then stayed home for 12 years to homeschool my children. Since starting at MHFC I have received my certification in the "Growing Up Wild" program, become a "Certified Organic Vegetable Specialist" and will soon complete training as a Master Naturalist. In this month of reflection and gratitude, I would like to humbly appreciate the amazing opportunity I have to share my passion about nature with all the students at our school. Thank you to the owners and director of Montessori House for providing a place where the love of nature can be nurtured.



In my studies, I "discovered" the Katy Prairie, its incredible value and the risk it currently faces. I am thrilled to share some of what I have learned with you. On Friday, Nov. 7th from 5-6 p.m. we will be doing a "Great Grow Out" in conjunction with the Katy Prairie at our school to provide interested families the opportunity to grow their own native prairie plants to be used at their homes and/or in the school pocket prairie! I look forward to working together with you and your children on the saving The Prairie!

What is a Prairie?

When French explorers first encountered our Native Tall-Grass prairies they didn't have a name for it, so they called it "Prairie". This is the French word for meadow. The official definition is "an extensive, level or slightly undulating, mostly treeless tract of land characterized by a highly fertile soil and originally covered by course grasses." Today, there is only 1%, (yes, 1%) of original tall-grass prairie left! It is the most endangered ecosystem left on this Earth! More than the Rainforest or Coral Reefs!

Why does it matter to me you say? Well, it is home to hundreds of species of wildlife and native grasses and wildflowers. The prairie is also enormously productive, offering services to the region, including reducing downstream flooding, removing sediment and pollutants from nearby wetlands and water bodies, offering great recreational opportunities, and sequestering carbon. Some even believe these native grasses, with their extensive root systems will help us stop the build-up of carbon in our atmosphere. The Katy Prairie Conservatory has already conserved 20,000 acres of the Katy Prairie, a once vast tall grass prairie.
