

DUAL-LANGUAGE CLASSROOMS STARTING 2018-2019 SCHOOL YEAR!

What does this mean for my child?

TODDLER COMMUNITY

Our toddler community is rich with vocabulary, primarily English and Spanish. Toddler aged children are in a period of development that thrives upon the acquisition of language. During this unique period of time, children develop vocabulary and comprehend the meaning of words, from any spoken language! Guides in our toddler community speak interchangeably, between English and their native language.

EARLY CHILDHOOD COMMUNITY

Children of our Early Childhood community are exposed to many different languages. The Montessori curriculum is presented in English, by the lead guide, and assistant guides primarily communicate with children in their native language, which could consist of Spanish, Hindi, Arabic, Russian, etc. (depending on classroom placement). Additionally, Spanish class begins at the Early Childhood level, occurring twice weekly, during their community group time. Spanish class is taught by a native Spanish speaker and offers an introduction to vocabulary, songs and literature.

LOWER & UPPER ELEMENTARY:

Spanish and English are the two primary languages of the Elementary Community. Lessons with the Montessori materials are presented primarily in English (with exception of the Spanish language materials), and guides converse primarily in Spanish. All guides are bilingual in English and Spanish, with Spanish being their native language. Additionally, Spanish class is included in the weekly "specials" schedule, in addition to PE, Art, Music and Nature Education.

Eco-Action Team Year-End Summary

The Eco Action Team would like to sincerely thank the students, teachers and volunteers who have participated, supported and attended the activities held during the school year 2017-2018. It has been a very successful year and much has been accomplished.

<u>Eco Action Team Meetings</u>: The objective of this semester was to maintain our Silver Award awarded by the National Wildlife Federation, by highlighting the pathways accomplished in the previous year, Biodiversity and Consumption & Waste and complete a new pathway, Schoolyard Habitat. Six (6) Eco Action Team meetings have been held throughout the academic year. The first semester focused on completing the requirements for Biodiversity and Consumption & Waste and introduce Schoolyard Habitat. The second semester focused solely on Schoolyard Habitat. Each meeting agenda included group presentations followed by pathway group discussions and activities. Many of our presentations were supported by Ms. Diane Russell, Master Naturalist from the Katy Prairie Conservatory and we thank them for the continued support in their outreach and community educational activities.

<u>Highlights</u>:

- Increased our Biodiversity Index which has increased due to the continued work by the children to improve upon their butterfly and prairie gardens
- Reduced our school waste by 12% and continued to sustain recycling and green practices in daily activities.
- Fostered, nurtured and released nearly 100 Monarch Butterflies during the peak Monarch Butterfly migration through Houston between 10th -22nd October 2017
- Achieved Wildlife Habitat certification for elementary gardens
- Increased the diversity and quantity of insects and animals through the creation of toad and insect houses, bird houses and solitary bee homes.
- Held two successful garden days where all the gardens were maintained and improved
- Planted 6 fruit trees and 4 shade/flowering trees generously donated by the Trees for Houston
- Established our Peace Garden and Conflict Resolution Area through the American Montessori Society (AMS) Peace Garden grant

As the new school year approaches, **we are seeking volunteers** to assist in leading and/or organizing meetings and pathway group sessions. Being part on our Eco Action Team can be very rewarding and fulfilling, so take the next step. - Take them to your work spot and let your child understand that you work very hard to support the family.
- Do not miss the local festival and local market.
- Gently encourage your child to raise a kitchen garden by planting seeds. Knowledge about plants and trees are an integral part of your child's growing up.
- Share stories about your childhood and your family history.
